Playdough is a toddler classroom staple! Whether it comes from a can or a DIY recipe, toddlers love to experience all the sensory output playdough offers. You can pinch it, squeeze it, roll it, flatten in, tear it, use tools or molds, create sculptures, the possibilities are limitless! In honor of National Play-Doh Day on September 16th, here's a fun new activity to try with your toddlers. Playdough Sticky Wall Mural

Materials: Playdough, tools, contact paper, painter's tapes, scissors.

To implement the activity, cut a sheet of contact paper and tape it to the wall with the sticky side facing out. Encourage the toddlers to experiment with placing pieces of playdough on the sticky surface. This open-ended activity can go in any direction that interests the children! Join in while toddlers manipulate the materials to guide their explorations, offer hints or assistance as needed, offer individualized feedback of their efforts, ask openended questions about what they are doing in the moment.

CLASS Connections:

Regard for Child Perspectives: Child focus, flexibility, support of independence.

Facilitation of Learning and Development: Active facilitation, children's active engagement.

Quality of Feedback: Scaffolding, encouragement and affirmation.

Language Modeling: Supporting language use, repetition and extension, self and parallel-talk.

Who doesn't love a Teddy Bear? The cuddly stuffed animals have provided hugs, company, security, and fun since the early 1900's. And what a better way to honor our furry friends then by inviting them to our classrooms to celebrate Teddy Bear Day, which is held annually on September 9th. Here some ideas to help you celebrate Teddy Bear Day in your classroom:

Add Teddy themed stories to your classroom library and read them as a class or encourage the children to read to their bear!

Corduroy by Don Freeman; Where's my Teddy by Jez Alborough Ira Sleeps Over by Bernard Waber

Bear Compare:

Challenge children to sort their bears by specific characteristics (size, color, etc.), place hula hoops on the floor to create a Venn Diagram of teddy bears, graph similarities or differences among the bears.

<u>Instructional Learning Formats:</u> Variety of modalities and materials, student interest. <u>Concept Development:</u> Analysis and reasoning, connections to the real world. <u>Language Modeling:</u> Open-ended questions, repetition and extension, self and parallel-talk.

Families come in so many varieties and there is so much love to celebrate! This month, we celebrate the older generation in our lives on Grandparent's Day which falls on September 10th. Grandparents play many roles in families, they can be caregivers, playmates, and teachers. Depending on distance and circumstance they can be hands-on or virtual.

As a class, brainstorm ways to celebrate Grandparent's Day that could include many types of families. Do your grandparents live locally? Plan to spend a day together, cook a family favorite meal, learn one of your grandparent's hobbies, look at old family photos. Are you grandparents far away? Plan a video chat, send a card or letter in the mail, visit older family friends who may not have family locally. What questions would you like to ask your grandparents? What was it like when they were growing up? How were things different than they are today, is there anything that is the same?

Every family is unique, including the older generation that fills the grandparent role. Celebrate their wisdom and life experience is ways that fill your family with love!

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Introducing ASQ Screenings to Parents Rebecca Huth, Inclusion Specialist

Parents will be more comfortable and engaged in screening when they understand what it's for and how it works. Below are 5 key areas to cover with parents when you introduce ASQ-3 and SE and ask them to participate. Consider informing parents of ASQ's in enrollment packets or send flyers through your digital communication system. Parents should be notified prior to screenings being completed on their child.

Share the purpose of the screening with parents.

Parents may worry about participating in a screening program. Some may be new to the idea; others might fear that their child will be labeled. Here are some things to say:

- "The ASQ-3 and SE provides a quick check of your child's development."
- "The answers will show your child's strengths and any areas in which your child may need more help or practice."

Give parents guidance and make them feel prepared to successfully complete a screening.

Completing the ASQ questionnaires is simple but parents doing it for the first time will appreciate some tips to say:

- "Try each activity with your child before you mark a response and have necessary materials."
- "Make this a game that's fun for your child."
- "Make sure your child is fed and rested."

Explain how the ASQ screenings work.

Describe the developmental areas of both the ASQ-3 and SE, the items within these areas, and the Overall Response section. You might say:

- "Your child may be able to do some, but not all of the items."
- "It is not a pass/fail or diagnostic screening."
- "Here are the 5 developmental areas we'll look at on the ASQ-3. Here are the social-emotional areas we'll look at on the ASQ-SE.
- "The Overall Response section asks questions about your child's development and about any concerns you may have."

Review the response options and what they mean.

The ASQ-3 and the ASQ-SE asks to choose one of three possible answers:

- Yes/Often or always means the child can consistently do it.
- Sometimes means that your just is just beginning to do it or does it inconsistently.
- Not yet/Rarely or never means the child is not yet performing or rarely performs it.

Tell parents you will share the results with them.

- Let parents know that you'll be in touch to share the results. Give them a timeframe.

What comes to mind when you think about kindergarten readiness? Site words? Counting to 30? Recognizing and writing names? What about life skills? Here are some suggestions of ways to help our kiddos feel ready to tackle kindergarten that are outside of the academic standards.

Practice knowing their family information: Their own first and last name, the first and last names of their caregivers, caregivers phone number, and their address.

Lunch procedures: Did they bring lunch from home or are they eating a school meal? Practice opening lunch items for themselves, like sting cheese, yogurt cups or tubes, peeling fruit, opening milk carton or juice boxes. Learn which items go in the trash when they are finished, and which items need to go home to be washed and used again.

Self-care skills: Bathroom routines; flush the toilet, wash hands, secure/fasten clothing. Personal care; blowing their nose, tying their shoes, taking off/putting on jackets.

September 23 is National Public Lands Day in which most entrances fees are waived for state parks. Hiking, biking, boating, fishing, picnicking, bird watching, camping, stargazing, and much more are available throughout Northeast Florida.

Black Creek Park and Trail in Flemming Island offers great trails for hiking and mountain biking. **Clarke House Park** in Orange Park is very family friendly, with ziplines, climbing play structures, swings, nature trails, and seating.

Edwards Road Sports Complex and Splash Park in Starke features tennis and racquet ball courts, fields, playgrounds, skating, and a splash park.

Flagler Estates Community Center and Park in Hastings includes basketball courts, playgrounds, and picnic pavilions.

St. Mary Shoals Park in Macclenny offers pavilions, trails, river access, and geocaching!

Important Reminders about Florida's Assessment of Student Thinking (FAST) using Star Early Literacy

VPK FAST Training Requirements

VPK programs are required to have a qualified test administrator administer the assessment to students. To be qualified as a test administrator, staff must complete and document completion of professional learning training annually. To complete the VPK FAST training requirements, participants will need to register in Renaissance-U. Required test administrator training is available through Renaissance-U: <u>FAST Star Early Literacy Renaissance-U Enrollment Guidance</u> This is now an annual requirement.

Provider Portal Updates

Providers also need to designate an Admin User for Renaissance in the Business Tab/External Users/ Renaissance section of the provider portal. For detailed instruction please refer to the Manage External Users_Provider Portal User Guide that was emailed as an attachment to providers in early. Please note that any changes made in the Provider Portal will take at least 24-48 hours to update in Renaissance.

Child Assessments

To complete assessments please ensure you are using the new Renaissance site: https://global-zone05.renaissance-go.com/welcomeportal/7957988.

Also, you will need to designate an Admin User for Renaissance in the Business Tab/External Users/ Renaissance section of the provider portal. Please see the Manage External Users_Provider Portal User Guide that was emailed as an attachment to providers in early August for instructions on how to add the Admin user in the provider portal. Any changes made in the Provider portal will take at least 24-48 hours to update in Renaissance.

VPK School Year Programs FAST Star Early Literacy Test Administration Schedule for Progress Monitoring (PM):

PM1: Is the first thirty (30) instructional days of the VPK class schedule beginning with the first VPK instructional day.

PM2: Is the period of time in a VPK class schedule where at least 40% of the instructional hours have been completed and no more than 60% of the instructional hours have been completed.

PM3: Is the last thirty (30) instructional days of the VPK class schedule ending on the last VPK instructional day *Providers are required to provide student performance results to the family within 7 calendar days of each PM administration using the Star Parent Report.
